
#### Homes with bad lighting:

#### Think Outside The Box - Create your own backgrounds for Holiday Photos:

In order to get the blurry, **dream-like backgrounds** in your photography, you need to make sure you're shooting with your aperture at it's lowest possible setting. In layman's terms, this means the lens is all the way open, **allowing in the most light it possibly can** when you take a picture and as a result, creating **depth** in your image. If you take a portrait of your children in front of the Christmas tree, for example, this setting will turn the ornaments, lights and other out-of-focus elements behind them into big, beautiful circles of light called **bokeh**This can be done on your iPhone as well.
